Hear her on Facebook 'MaindeeLibrary' or Youtube 'Street Media'. **Hugh Clark:** There was great sadness in Maindee when people heard of the death of Hugh Clark, one of the area's greatest characters. He was a councillor for the old Maindee ward in the late 60's and then for Beechwood from 1999 to 2012, having won the last by-election of the 20th century. Had he been re-elected in 2012 he would have been Mayor of Newport.

Despite suffering increasingly from MS, he was an assiduous councillor. He was to be seen around the ward on his buggy and he rarely missed a council or committee meeting or a ward surgery. As a governor of St Julian's Primary School he attended all meetings and school concerts etc. He was constantly on the phone sorting out constituents' problems, as he always knew exactly the right person to contact.

at Spencer Works from its inception and he chaired the Iron & Steel Federation Union and his meetings with manage-



ment were undoubtedly lively affairs. Like half the staff he was made redundant and took a degree course at Caerleon before becoming a lecturer at Nash College.

He was always surrounded by books, having been born opposite the Carnegie Library in Corporation Road. He wrote for publications like the Guardian and Punch. In the late 1980's he was employed by the Community House Urban Aid Project to write The Maindee Book and a Maindee Companion to foster a sense of

He was a lifelong Liberal, displaying a "Join the Liberals" sticker on his car during his and Val's honeymoon tour of the West Country, and he fought the parliamentary seat of Abertillery



in the 1970's. He was President of Newport liberal Democrats.

He was a loyal supporter of Newport County AFC having been a season ticket

holder since the 1950s. He was proud to have the Supporters' Club membership card number 1.

He worked at Monsanto's where he met Val and they were married for 56 years. He later worked

community in Maindee. He visited numerous people to record their memories and publish their photographs. 2,000 copies of the first book were sold and a similar number of the second. They are both long out of print and are now collectors' items keenly sought after. A reprint is surely called for.

Despite his illness, Hugh remained cheerful and good tempered and he never lost his wicked sense of humour. He was always good company and a delight to be with. He will be sadly missed.

geographical choices they made to live in the area. This photographic project aims to show some of the stories through the eyes of the local community.





Street Media: Maindee is full of stories!

The Street Media initiative is designed to help young residents of Maindee (under 25) use media and film. Street Media is managed by Mohamad Fez Miah - a lecturer on the University of South Wales Audio Visual Programmes as well as multimedia coordinator for Urban Circle Productions. Fez has developed a peer-based mentoring and support initiative and offers training and resources for people interested in exploring film and media as a career route. One of the first Street Media initiatives is a short film.

Short Film 'ExTchange'

Director Onismo Muhlanga, aged 23 and who goes by the name Nizmo, has got to know Maindee by having his hair styled by young Yemenese barber Sammy on Church Road. Nizmo's directing abilities have cemented him as a respected music video director based in Wales and he has worked with the likes of Fernquest, Dee Shae, Mason and TKD to name but a few of the up and coming musicians of the area.

Nizmo recently decided to approach New Paths with an idea to make a short film.
Having become a father recently he wanted to make a film that, in his own words, would "raise awareness of ongoing social problems that are affecting young people in society on a daily basis".

Since April 2016 Nizmo has led a group of students from the media class at St Julian's Comprehensive School to create this film. Street Media has been able to back the project by sharing skills, mentoring and developing film making and communication skills. The film has gone into production and will be premiering at the Fairness Commissions film screening at The Neon on Saturday 9th July... To read more go to www.maindee.org



Branding Maindee

It was decided early on that Maindee needed a brand which would represent and tie together all the diverse activities in the area, and that residents, traders and visitors alike could get behind. Before we started any design work on the Maindee Identity, we developed a questionnaire for residents, traders and visitors of Maindee to tell us their feelings about various aspects of the area. There was much negativity in the responses to our survey, but there were a couple of aspects that were clearly seen as positives: Maindee's Multicultural makeup, and it's Community Spirit.

Here are some of the many things people said, split into negative comments, positive comments and suggestions.

"Image needs to improve cosmetically"

'Clean it up, invest – its a dump"

"The triangle is unsuitable for change - focus on the car park"

"Looks tired"

"Used to be lovely, buzzing"

"Needs cleaning up to make it more village like"

"Needs environmental improvement"

"People are caring but we do have a lot of crime"

"It is not the most desirable place to live - if it improves I will stay, if not, I will move"

"Not a very safe environment"

"Exciting to be part of a community lead project. Maindee is becoming more community active"

"Village idea is strong"

"Close-knit community, family-orientated"

"Diverse community and good local shops"

"Close & convenient for shops and Rodney Parade"

"There's a lot of talent in Maindee and an interest in developing the community"

"Maindee Festival contributes greatly to the community"

"I believe it has a lot of potential"

"We need a community centre"

"We need something like Chapter Arts"

"Important to build on momentum of the volunteers in the library"

"Help put Maindee back on the map - local businesses pulling together - could be thriving"

"We need more youth projects and shops"

"More to be done with railway bridge. These could be magnificent gateways - giant colour murals and coherent to the high St. with colour/brand"

"Market would be lovely"

"The Library should become a social hub" Having processed all responses to the survey, we focussed on the positive comments that were made about the people of Maindee, being its most positive asset – with high praise for the volunteers behind the library, the festival and Community House. Without the dedicated volunteers of Maindee, there is no Maindee brand identity... so we came up with the phrase:

PEOPLE ARE THE BUILDING BLOCKS OF MAINDEE'S IDENTITY




"More to be done with railway bridge. These could be magnificent gateways - giant colour murals and coherent to the high St. with colour/brand"

Echoing that comment above about the iconic bridge, with its interlocking iron framework, we started with the single building block, as seen on the right.



This represents YOU – a volunteer, a resident, a trader, or a visitor. It represents anyone with a passion for Maindee and a will to see it improve.

Alone it is strong, but Maindee's true strength lies in the coming together of these individuals, working together to build a better Maindee.



THE FRAMEWORK

We made a distinctive letter 'M' for Maindee, constructed from a combination of the individual building blocks. This is the framework for Maindee's identity, and it offers the flexibility required to represent all of Maindee's different services and projects.

THE COLOURS

Maindee's multicultural diversity means that Maindee is a vibrant riot of colour – as anyone who's ever attended Maindee Festival will know.

We've chosen three colourways for the identity, which we call Neon, Aqua and Flame, each is made up of a blend of colours.







"I love where I live. I chose it and I want it to be the best it can be for everyone's enjoyment. It is no worse or better than anywhere else, but I'd like to see improvement and

investment to encourage everyone who lives here, visits and drives through it to recognise a Maindee brand and to start the process of engendering pride in the place; pride will hopefully lead to cohesion and people taking better care in terms of litter etc and making the effort to join in with all the interesting things planned over the next year."

THE MESSAGE

An 'M' alone wasn't enough, so we needed strapline to support the brand, and chose "Building a new Maindee Together", which echoes the construction theme, whilst also stressing the fact that these projects only happen when the people of Maindee come together to make a difference.

We wanted the typeface to reflect the 'hands-on' approach of Maindee's volunteers, whilst also offering a contrast to the rigid grid and sharp lines of the M. After much type testing we came up with the finished brand for Maindee:

We would like to thank everyone who took the time to complete the survey, and help show us the way to what we feel is a vibrant and strong brand for the community to get behind. You'll start to see Maindee's new brand identity rolling out over the next few weeks and months.

Taking Fairness Seriously Maindee Film Festival

Set-up by Newport City Council in 2012, Newport Fairness Commission is an independent body which looks critically at Council policy, focussing on what it means to spend resources 'fairly' within our city. The Commission also encourages public discussion on what it means to have a 'fair society', recognising that people will have many different views on this, stories to tell and issues to raise. We will have a stall at the festival on the 9th July (so look out for us!), and we will be showing a series of films at The Neon (recently reopened on Clarence Place) from 2.30pm that day.

These films include one made by young people from Newport about how young people are often unfairly portrayed. Simon Orman and his team from the USW Documentary Film Course in Newport explains this particular piece – "We are offering insight into differing perspectives into what fairness is. Where we are showcasing 15 accounts of how fairly the people of Newport feel they are treated in the city."

There is also film made by Nizmo Muhlanga and the Maindee Street Media Team; another by students from the University of South Wales about Newport people's stories of fairness; and The Divide, a full-length 2016 feature documentary looking at different people's experiences in the USA and the UK of what it means to live in a society which is divided between very rich and very poor people.

So we'd love to see you on 9 July at our Maindee Festival stall, and at the screenings at The Neon. And we'd love to hear your views on fairness. There's a conversation going on across Newport and beyond, about how to make our city fairer. Be part of it!


