#### About Us


Maindee Unlimited is an incorporated charity run by local volunteers. It was set up in 2015. We are based in the library on Chepstow Road next to the Police Station.

#### Overview by Ruth Essex, Project Manager

The District Centre in Maindee is long overdue for a big makeover. **Chepstow Road is noisy**, **dirty** and too **busy** with traffic. Sections of the pavement are too narrow. **The car park is a mess**. The overall feeling is of a tired and worn street that has seen much better days. So, in January, with financial backing from the UK Government **Community Renewal Fund**, Maindee Unlimited began work on the "District Centre Renewal Project".

This first phase of the project runs until **July 2022**. We will be designing new layouts for the carpark and the stretch of Chepstow Road that runs through the District Centre. Designs will prioritise pedestrians and sustainable travel to help reduce some of the negative impacts of petrol and diesel vehicles. There is lots of potential to create more attractive and people– friendly spaces that will also attract more customers for local business.

The project will include a strand looking at ways to reduce waste and pollution and to reuse, share and recycle resources as much as possible. Aimee Parker, our lead expert for this part of the project, can be contacted on 07967918915 or aimeeparkerconsultancy@gmail.com There will be lots of opportunities for local residents and traders to develop and input their own ideas and solutions over the next few months. Year 7 students at St Julians School have already started on this and we hope this "Class of 2022" will keep an involvement with the project as it moves from planning to implementation in years to come.

The increasing risk of flash floods means we also need to see how we can improve drainage. "Sustainable Urban Drainage Systems", or SuDs for short, might have a role to play. They are a bit like urban reens: increasing greenery, reducing the impact of flooding, helping to clean the air and just making people living in the City feel a bit healthier and relaxed.

We have just appointed Roberts Limbricks Ltd (www.robertslimbrick.com) whose highly experienced team of Newport– based urban design team will turn everyone's ideas into the technical design proposals that we will need to raise the multi–million funding needed to implement the changes.

The success of this project and quality of designs very much relies on people who live or work locally getting involved. So get in touch to let us know what you are interested in, to receive updates or just to have a chat. We will be hosting a variety of **online and in-person events** over the next few months and we want to make sure you know about them and can be properly involved if you want to.

#### On the Buses

Back in 2019, a report came out that could significantly affect traffic in Maindee District Centre. "The Final Recommendations of the South East Wales Transport Commission", now known as "The Burns Report", recommended that a new rapid bus route should be created between the City Centre and the Coldra, taking in the International Conference Centre, Chepstow Road through Maindee, Clarence Place and the Town Bridge.

The report saw Chepstow Road as a key corridor for better cycling and bus priority as it connects large amounts of East Newport to the City Centre.

Some pavements in Maindee District Centre are already very narrow and the road itself is often congested with traffic, especially in the multi-lane section by Wetherspoons, so it could be tricky to fit in a dedicated rapid bus route. The Burns Delivery Unit, that has been set up to implement all the recommendations, is working with the Newport City Council Highways Authority to determine the preferred option for this route.

The timing of this ties in quite nicely with the District Centre Renewal Project. **So, Maindee Unlimited and the City's Highway Team met recently to discuss ideas.** They have agreed to work closely together to try to dovetail together these two separately funded, but high related, projects – a bit of joined up thinking.

### Shop Talk

"Centre for Cities" reported in January that a third of the commercial units in the City Centre were empty. The recent closures of Lloyds Bank and Cayzers on Chepstow Road might suggest that Maindee District Centre faces similar vacancy problems.

The trend, however, seems to be going the other way. Some of the bigger shop units that had been empty for years (such as the Coop building and 131 Chepstow Road) are now refurbished and back in business. The builders are already converting Cayzers shop and several other new startups have opened during the pandemic or are about to open.

One positive factor for Maindee traders is the comparatively low cost of premises. Lower rents plus lower business rates and, in many cases, 100% small business rate relief can make Maindee a good prospect for smaller independent start-ups.


Victoria Ward is the most densely populated area of Newport. The many terraced streets

than surround the District Centre means there is a large resident population within easy walking distance of the shops. Another positive factor.

Bus connectivity is good. Although car parking charges are cheaper than the City Centre (First hour in Maindee: £1; first hour in City Centre: £2.50) the physical environment of the car park leaves a lot to be desired.

Generally, it is (a) the tired physical condition of the car park and Chepstow Road, (b) the poor use of space for people and the total lack of greenery and (c) the relentless noise and dirt from excessive through traffic that are the negative factors that let the Centre down as a modern retail destination.

If the Renewal Project can start to effectively tackle these problems it could be a real help to current and future businesses – and their customers too.



Maindee Unlimited is researching trader waste and recycling patterns for businesses in Maindee. #### St Julians Designers

Should children and young people have a voice in developing plans for the renewal of Maindee District Centre?

If you asked that to Year 7 students at St Julians School they might think you were a bit slow on the update. Since the start of this term teachers and Year 7 pupils have already started developing their ideas and have already caught the eye of the Renewal Project. A new generation of urban planners is emerging!

Not surprisingly, there is a strong call for change. "I would love to see this area transformed from grey to green" says Emilia Attorre of Archibald Street. This idea about greening the area is endorsed by Emir Aydin of Corporation Road, who also notes that the area needs to be safer for everyones' future.

In a circular economy we get more use out of things and waste a lot less. This idea is picked up well by Lynda Attwell of Batchelor Road who says she *"would be happy if things in Maindee turned from unused to reused"*. The first crop of drawings show strong support for new play facilities everywhere. It is refreshing to see this as such a priority – how can we translate this into real delivery?

Interestingly, car parking is not seen as a priority. Is it just because these children are too young to drive – or does this new generation see the world differently from their parents and grandparents?

The unique and forward-thinking ideas that these young people are developing are important. They will be displayed online and in local shop windows over the next few months. Look out for design drawings with multicoloured pathways, outdoor cafés, trampolines, vegetable gardens, painted streets, ducks, flowers, book shelves, ponds, sculptures made of recycled materials and much, much more.

#### The Triangle Update

The Triangle development on Chepstow Road is nearing completion. The main contractor should finish in early April. After commissioning and landscaping, the whole site should re-opened in May / June. The radical design by London / Berlin architect KHBT features a bright yellow large vertical wall that is already rasing some eyebrows.

"Great!", says John Hallam from Maindee Unlimited. "We wanted something attentiongrabbing that would really signal change".

The yellow wall is the backdrop to a new children's playstage built over the base of the cicular planter. The site will also features community planting beds, mature trees, grassed play areas, a cafe with outdoor covered seats, outdoor benches and, importantly, new public toilets. "We are delighted to be re-opening a public toilet for community benefit" says Maindee Unlimited Chair, David Moses.

"It is five years since the Council closed the toilets and local residents and traders were getting fed up with the deteriorating behaviour on the site. It feels good that we have been able to turn that around."

Maindee Unlimited is now finalising a sublease of the café space. The income raised from that will be used to cover toilet cleaning, site maintenance and insurance.

Planning is now underway for a **grand opening.** One idea is to hold a Platinum Jubilee street party on The Triangle and Livingstone Place on **Sunday 5<sup>th</sup> June – what do you think?**

## NEW: Maindee Food Pantry

### Pop into the Food Pantry for some free food

Loads of great food gets wasted every day. So a group of local food activists have just opened Maindee Food Pantry in the Library at 79 Chepstow Road, NP19 8BY.

They think it is better if people can have food for free than letting it go to waste. Everyone can use the Pantry and take any food they need. There is no charge and you don't have to join anything or show any documents – the big idea is just to save good food from being wasted.

The Pantry, which opened in February, has already saved 575kg of food from being dumped – that's over half a ton in old money! Proper food management procedures are in place and all volunteers are trained – so any food you take is totally safe. The main rules are: **(1)** Respect the crew and everyone else in the library **(2)** Only take what you need **(3)** Take your turn – first come first served **(4)** All food must be weighed before it is taken away. The Pantry is currently open between 2.30pm and 4.30pm on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays – and on Saturday between 10.30am and 12pm.

It can be a bit of a lottery knowing what type of food will be there on any given day. "It all depends on what any supermarket gives us on the day we collect" says Food Pantry volunteer coordinator, Jane Shatford. "Things are settling down nicely with the supermarkets now we are getting a more routine collection schedule in place".
